### **Public Engagement**

#### State of the Art Practices in Outreach and Public Engagement

During the planning stages of the “One Region Forward” initiative no request was denied to meet with a group, no matter what size. The dialog continued until every question and comment was received and discussed. Meetings were held in private homes, churches, and restaurants. People were met where they felt comfortable such as in their own neighborhoods and in smaller settings. The results were amazing. Thousands of citizens participated across the two counties over the course of two years, from the most rural villages to downtown Buffalo. People felt they were being heard and their thoughts mattered. Children were also included in outreach activities and attended the Community Congress and Workshops on the Road. The resulting “One Region Forward” is a cutting edge sustainability plan for the region, based on unprecedented public engagement and outreach efforts. There is much we can learn from this model.

Dr. Shibley will explain that collaboration pays off. When the public asks, “Who are you to tell me what to do in my town?” Answer with, “We’re not. We are providing tools, better information, a way of thinking, and public engagement. We don’t tell you what to do. We tell you what the consequences of what you are thinking about might be.” His extensive public engagement is really rooted in that kind of scenario planning. “If you do X, then this will be the short and long term consequences and financial costs.”

#### Open Data: What It Is, How It Can Help You, and Where to Start

**PRACTITIONER WORKSHOPS**

The three practitioner based workshops will be hosted by the Local Government Efficiency section of DLGS and will focus on successful local government functional consolidations of Public Safety, Infrastructure, and Administrative services. The proposed format is a brief discussion with an individual or individuals from a Local Government in NYS that has recently implemented a successful consolidation, of that type, followed by a free flowing conversation with the attendees about that consolidation or a similar consolidation the attendee is trying to implement.

## **Public Safety**

On January 1, 2011 the Town and Village of Saugerties combined police forces under a town wide department. This session will review the process that the municipalities undertook to get to the point of consolidation and review the benefits that have been realized since.

## **Infrastructure**

The Town of Hyde Park has partnered with the Dutchess County Water and Wastewater Authority (DCWWA) to transfer the Town's water and wastewater systems to DCWWA. The project has helped the town manage the challenge of maintaining aging infrastructure amid growing complexities in the regulation, coupled with growing pressures to reduce the costs of providing municipal services.

## **Highway Services**

The Town of Chemung and the Town of Ashland, with cooperation from Chemung County, are completing the consolidation of the municipal highway departments. The project, which required the highway superintendent position in the Town of Ashland to become appointive through local referendum, will save the local governments over \$175,000 annually.
